On September 14th, New England Village hosted its Olympic-themed 2024 Family & Friends Day, a wonderful celebration of the strong sense of community that defines NEV.

Events like these highlight the essential role our broader community plays in our success.

The Olympic theme for this day was fitting, as it allowed us to reflect on some of NEV's own "Olympic" moments over the past year. From the achievements of the individuals we support to the teamwork and dedication of our staff, each day brings its own kind of victory.

During the State of the Village session at Family & Friends Day, we were excited to introduce new members of our leadership team, who are already making a significant impact. Jonathan Grabowski, our new Vice President of Communications & Development, brings over 20 years of experience in non-profit management. Dan Cosgrove, our new Vice President of Human Resources, offers 25 years of HR leadership with a focus on staff recruitment and retention—key areas of focus for us. And we were thrilled to welcome back Lauren Mulkern as Director of Residential Services, who brings 16 years of experience in human services. You can read more about each of them in this edition. We also highlighted the completion of the first full year of our current strategic

plan this June. Our efforts have focused on strengthening internal systems, improving staff training, and deepening our commitment to community inclusion. Key achievements include the creation of a Positive Behavior Support (PBS) Leadership Team and an effective push to increase attendance at the Efron Center for Enrichment's Day Habilitation program. We also introduced "Giving Pillars" to better align our fundraising with strategic goals. We are thrilled that the Family Association has chosen to support one of these pillars moving forward, further emphasizing the importance of family involvement in our mission.

Looking ahead, the support of our community remains crucial, especially as we reflect on the progress of recent advocacy efforts. These efforts have led to a 20% increase in the Department of Developmental Services (DDS) state funding for Adult Long-Term Residential Services. The \$390 million investment in this line item for human services within the FY 2025 State Budget marks a historic

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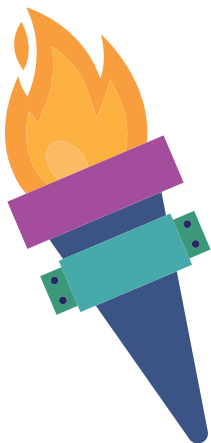

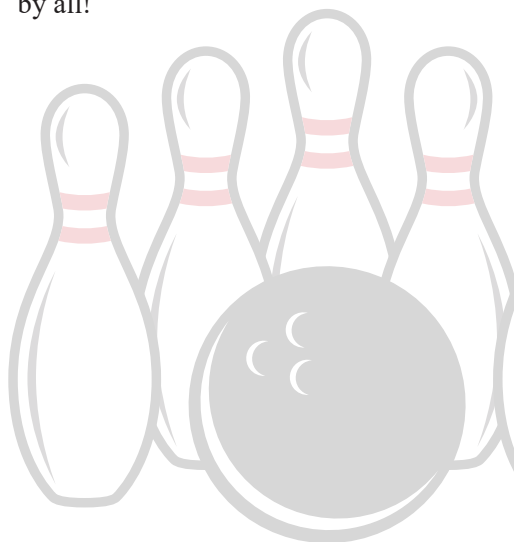

Wonders of the World

Mixed Media Assemblages

The mixed media assemblages are “process oriented” art, and the focus is primarily placed upon the exploration of making art. This process allows for the pleasurable freedom to simply create without concern for a defined outcome. Some pieces are assembled as clusters; some in a linear style. Some pieces are collaborative (many artists contributed to one piece), while others are created solely by one artist.

The goal was to spend time experimenting with paint, ribbon and, finally, assembling these components. During this process, artists also worked on their fine motor skills by using a hole puncher, stringing ribbon through holes and weaving pieces together. Once the variety of experiments feels complete to the artist, attention is then given to the elements of design through assemblage; composition, repetition of pattern.

Individual artist’s impulses (brush pressure, color choices, composition) may dictate specific aspects of each piece, yet, the basic elements (rectangular paper, paint and ribbon) provide a cohesiveness to the finished pieces.

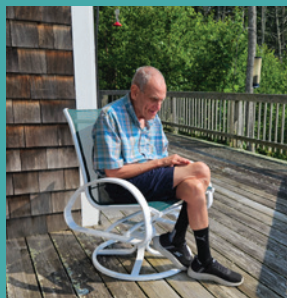

I'm sitting on the swing."

"The sensory wall panel at ECE was a great idea," Lisa added. "It provides engagement for visual processing, the use of fine motor skills, and balance."

Since the beginning of the year, the Family Association has provided New England Village with not only an excellent summer party and the sensory wall, but also a new event tent and a treadmill for Sollar Wellness Center, three beautiful cedar outdoor glider swings (two at the School Street location and one at ECE), a new landscape trailer, new carpeting for the Sheingold Building's training room and Ray Assembly Hall and, arriving later this year, 14 new round banquet tables.

The Association also provided all NEV staff with \$50 gas gift cards. The items provided for staff hold special meaning for Lisa, who would like to see staff appreciation items such as this continue. Not only is her brother, Kyle, also a resident at NEV, but she used to work in direct care, herself.

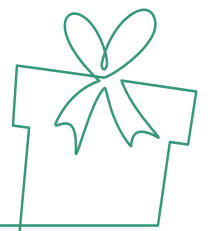
Gift Giving Policy

As the holiday season approaches, and with it the season for gift-giving and showing appreciation to staff who care for loved ones, we wanted to remind families and friends of NEV's gift-giving policy to staff.

In an effort to adhere to best practices, employees are strictly prohibited from accepting any gifts from individuals served. Gifts from family members, guardians, visitors, and others to employees are limited to \$25 or less; monetary gifts of any value are prohibited, as are gift cards.

Any family members, friends, or guardians who wish to give a holiday gift valued at more than \$25 or a monetary gift may instead make a contribution to the Employee Engagement and Recognition Committee. This Committee plans staff events and perks throughout the year. Checks can be sent to Jonathan Grabowski.

We believe this updated policy helps ensure staff equity and precludes potential conflicts of interest.

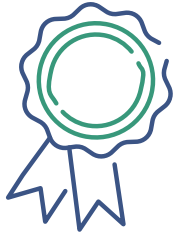

NEV Family Association



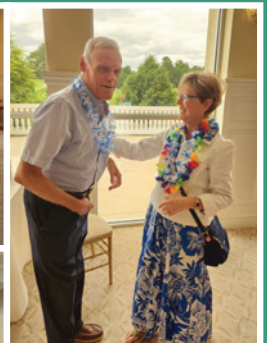
